





# Jax Snax—Healthy Dog Treats

#### **Ingredients:**

300g whole wheat flour 150g grated cheese (optional) 300ml water 1 large egg (approx. 50g) 550g peanut butter 80g honey

#### Method:

Preheat oven to 180 degrees C. You may either use your hands or a mixer with a paddle attachment. In a large bowl, combine the flour and egg (and cheese, if desired). Next, add the peanut butter, water and honey and mix until the dough is firm and sticky. On a lightly floured surface, roll out the dough to about ½ inch thick.

For training treats, you can use a pizza cutter or similar to cut into about ½ inch cubes.

You could also make larger biscuits as snack size treats, using any kind of cutter.

Place in the preheated oven and bake.

For training treats, bake for about 8 minutes, or until golden.

For larger biscuits, bake for 15-20 minutes (or again, until golden).

Remove from the oven and allow to cool. They will crisp up out of the oven, so don't worry if they are slightly soft when removed, but keep an eye on them to make sure they don't burn while in the oven.

#### NOTES:

Flour: Some dogs are allergic to flour/wheat. If you want to make these wheat free, you can use rice flour or coconut flour as a replacement. These alternate flours will work, but might change the consistency a bit.

**Peanut Butter:** Some peanut butter brands are including xylitol to cut the sugar in their peanut butter. Do not use any peanut butter containing xylitol as it is toxic to dogs. Just check for natural peanut butter and check the ingredients.

Honey: Avoid giving honey to immunocompromised dogs and dogs under 1 year old.

Please check the ingredients for anything that your dog may be sensitive/intolerant to.

#### St George! St George! For Merrie England

#### Childhood Encounters with St George

An enduring memory of my childhood, in the 1950s, is of being taken by my parents, one Christmas, to the theatre to see a performance of the hugely popular children's play, "Where the



Rainbow Ends." It was my first visit to the theatre and the play made a great impact on me. It had an even greater impact on the distinguished actress, Patricia Hodge, OBE, who plays the part of Mrs Pumphrey in the new television series All Creatures Great and Small. She relates that it was this play that had inspired her to pursue an acting career.

The play was based on the book of the same title by the Edwardian children's writer, Mrs Clifford Mills. First published in 1911, it tells the story of two English children, brother and sister, who go in search of their missing parents after reading an ancient text claiming that lost loved ones can be found in the land where the rainbow ends. They reach the land by magic carpet, only to find that it has fallen into the hands of the evil dragon king. The children enlist the help of St George, who protects them through various adventures, ultimately defeating the dragon king and reuniting them with their parents. The book concludes with the chorus:

'St George, St George, for Merrie England'.

Changing social attitudes and values in the 1960s saw the end of productions of the play, which had by then been viewed by some 20 million people. Its patriotic overtones were out of tune with the times. The book has long been out of print.

#### **Dream Days**

Another Christmas, I was given a copy of Dream Days by Kenneth Grahame, author of "The Wind in the Willows." The book contains several stories, including the tale of the Reluctant Dragon, which tells how a young dreamy shepherd boy finds a sleeping dragon high on the Berkshire Downs. He gets to learn that this gentle dragon loves poetry and the two fast become friends. But when the villagers discover the dragon, they send for the legendary St. George, who lived nearby in retirement, to slay the creature they see as a threat. Faced with losing his only friend in the world, the young boy must convince St. George not only to spare the dragon's life, but also to persuade the villagers of his kind and gentle nature.

The boy introduces St George to his friend the dragon. They get on well. Both agree to stage a mock fight. St George pretends to kill the dragon. The villagers are satisfied and return

home. The story ends with St George, the dragon and the boy walking uphill arm in arm into the sunset, singing old folk songs, with the dragon leading the singing.

Both these stories freely adapt the legend of St George and the Dragon and the myth that he was an Englishman. But as we know, St George was not English, but a Middle Eastern soldier who was born and died in Palestine. It is unlikely that he ever visited England, despite another legend that he undertook military service in York. He, according to the tale, sailed westwards from Palestine, through the strait in the Irish Sea that we know as St George's Channel, to a small port on the Lancashire coast, possibly Lancaster. Today, you may visit Lancaster and walk along St George's Quay.

The figure of St George is overlaid with many myths and legends, but if we look beneath them, we see a young soldier who was cruelly put to death in the 4th Century Great Persecution for refusing to renounce his Christian faith.

Let's raise a glass to St George, patron saint of England, on his feast day, 23 April!

# Playing in an orchestra

There is nothing like music for expressing emotion. The "Last post" played on the bugle on Remembrance Day, live at our war memorial, always gets me. My main hobby is playing the cello in two orchestras, but achieving that sort of effect with a group of sixty players is more complicated. Each orchestra meets once a week (Friday for Crosby Symphony Orchestra and Tuesday for Southport Orchestra), and most of us have to practice at home for hours.



Playing at the right time is the first priority. I keep my eyes glued to the music as I am playing (if I don't, I will get lost), but I have the conductor's baton in my field of vision. All sixty of us have to time our playing exactly to the "bounce" at the bottom of the conductor's beat, otherwise we will not be together.

Next priority is to play the right notes. We have key signatures, which act like a code to tell us when we have to play sharps or flats (usually like the black notes on a piano). If I forget what key I am supposed to be in, I have to let my eye dart back to the beginning of the line to check (without losing my place). Unlike a piano or guitar, most orchestral instruments need "tweaking" to get the note exactly right. For example, on a Cello, if I put my finger on the string a millimetre away from where it should be, it will sound out of tune. If we all play in tune, we achieve the harmony the composer wanted.

The music tells us whether we should bow or pluck the string; the direction to bow in (so we don't crash into each other); whether to play loud or soft; notes flowing or separated or accented. The upside of all this is that I have to concentrate so hard that it drives all worries out of my mind. Some of the fast sections have to be played by "muscle memory", the notes are going past so quickly that there isn't time to think.

The players are all amateurs, or music teachers, and don't get paid for playing in the concerts. We use our subscriptions and concert ticket money to engage professional conductors and soloists, although some of our more talented players do play solos and conduct us. The conductors inspire us. They tell us what effect the composer is looking to make, and how to achieve it. As an example, when we played Shostakovich's fifth symphony, the conductor explained how, to satisfy Stalin, the composer wrote in a martial style, but he

poured into the slow movement his deep sadness at the fate of his friends. The orchestra rose to the challenge of expressing this.

It is not all sadness. We recently played the Rosenkavalier Suite by Richard Strauss, which I think contains one of the best expressions of love ever written. It is a real privilege to be part of an orchestra which can make magical sounds like this.

Crosby Symphony Orchestra's next concert is on Sunday 30th April at 7:30pm in St. Faith's Church Crosby. The programme includes Tchaikovsky's Symphony

no. 4.

# Making Waves

Hi!

I'm Andy and I live in Hightown with my wife, Angela, and my dog, Sonny. I am addicted to open water swimming and am part of a swimming group called "The Vikings".

It all started In April 2021 when, whilst I was swimming in a pool, I struck up a conversation with a "young" man of 72 years, called Billy Seasman, (a retired semi-professional boxer). He asked me if I swam competitively. I told him that I had always enjoyed swimming but mainly swam in the indoor pool to keep fit. At the end of our chat, he invited me to swim with him, and some of his fellow "Vikings", at the Liverpool Watersports Centre. I now train for open water swimming with them, at the Liverpool Watersports Centre, near the Albert Dock.

When you swim in open water, whether that is in a wetsuit or "skins" (swimming shorts or a costume), you become 100%

focused. Nothing else enters your head. Any worries you may have are forgotten. From the moment you start your swim, to that well earned coffee and a piece of cake at the finish, nothing else enters your head. It didn't take long to catch the bug, and very soon I was swimming in open water races in the Albert Dock, Liverpool and in Ullswater, in the Lake District.

This year, I am swimming in Coniston in the Lake District, and other events in Liverpool, including the Mersey River swim in September, which is the local "Viking" tradition.

When the tides are right we also wild swim in the Mersey. We go "over the water" and start from Wallasey, swimming right the way along the coast line to New Brighton. We are, of course, always careful to ensure that the coast guard is aware of our activity.

The best place to learn open water swimming is at a venue similar to the Liverpool Watersports Centre. It organises training in the week and at the weekends, and welcomes all abilities, from beginners to the more experienced race swimmers. Everyone respects each other, and as it takes place in an enclosed dock, it's a safe environment to try open water swimming. The water is normally calm and you can swim for as short, or as long a distance, as you want.

There has been a boom in open water swimming, partly due to the lockdown, but also due to the range of benefits it brings, including: improved health and an increased social life, as you meet many like minded people.

You will never be judged, and the people you meet will soon become your friends.
